



Infant Feeding: Practice & Policy Course

2 weeks + 3 themed days: 1st– 12th July + 15th– 17th July 2013

About the course

Our masters-level course is the only advanced international training course on breastfeeding and related topics available worldwide and held in collaboration with WHO and UNICEF.

It is designed for senior health professionals who lead, coordinate or commission work on infant feeding, teach others or need to be informed and up-to-date so they can give strategic direction on breastfeeding and infant nutrition.

The course aims to strengthen participants' capacity for making an evidence-based case for investing in breastfeeding, and to take an active role in the broad spectrum of protecting, promoting and supporting optimal infant feeding practices.

Typically participants include paediatricians, midwifery lecturers, directors of primary care, infant feeding coordinators and public health specialists.

The course takes a global perspective and past participants have found it extremely useful whatever part of the world they come from. Teaching includes regional group work and comparative learning techniques to gain maximum educational advantage from the range of backgrounds and experiences present in the group.

The course is divided in two parts which can be taken together (recommended) or separately.


Part 1: 2 weeks **Infant Feeding: Clinical Management and Public Health Evidence**

Part 2: 3 themed days **Addressing Challenges to Optimal Practice and Implementation**, (which can be attended as single study days).

Fees for the full course are £1750 *early bird price* if paid before April 2013, £1900 thereafter.

University Accommodation is available (£25-£40/night).

Formerly the Breastfeeding: Practice & Policy Course held at UCL-Centre for International Child Health in London, the course has been refreshed and relocated to Brighton, on the coast, 50 miles south of London, with easy connections to and from London and London airports.
