#WBW2019 was celebrated in all regions of the world and included governments, UN agencies, civil society, media and the public at large. UNICEF/WHO released a joint message in support of World Breastfeeding Week 2019 highlighting the importance of family-friendly policies and greater investment in comprehensive breastfeeding programmes. WABA was part of the roundtable discussion on "Women, work, gender and equity: Challenges to support and protect breastfeeding" at the 3rd World Breastfeeding Conference held in Brazil. WABA presented on the topic of 'Breastfeeding and Informal Work' which was well-received and participants agreed that it is imperative to support breastfeeding women in the informal sector.

Join WABA to raise awareness of the specific challenges and outreach to organisations working with the informal sector. Work to advocate for the inclusion of informal sector workers in trade unions and collective bargaining agreements. Support the establishment of creches, train and deploy breastfeeding peer counsellors in the informal sector.

La Leche League International (LLLI)



- LLLI hired a new Executive Director, Zion Tankard, in September
- LLLI Area Network held **educational events** including a breastfeeding conference and Communication Skills Development workshop open to the public, the International Management Symposium for LLL administrators and leaders, and meetings between the Executive Director and Board of Directors with IAN Leaders. Close to 200 participated from 31 countries
- LLLI relaunched **Breastfeeding Today**, the online breastfeeding magazine for families
- LLLI continues its webinars
- LLL Europe is planning the European Management Symposium for LLL administrators and Leaders in March 2020



The Third World Breastfeeding Conference and the First World Complementary Feeding Conference was held in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil between 11- 15 November. The event kicked off with the "Thousand Mothers Breastfeeding" session, and the following updates:

1. Continuation of policies for the protection, promotion and support of breastfeeding and healthy complementary feeding

2. Protection of maternity at work

3. Protection against unethical marketing of products that replace breastfeeding

4. Support for humanized childbirth by strengthening the BFHI, human milk banks, kangaroo mother care and mother-to-mother support groups through counseling practices

5. In emergencies, breastfeeding should be the first resource, implementing international guidelines

Activities

- Presentation on the Global Breastfeeding Collective at the 3rd World Breastfeeding Conference in Rio de Janeiro (November 11-15) by France Bégin (UNICEF), Larry Grummer-Strawn (WHO) and Roger Mathisen (A&T). Advocacy tools and the Global Breastfeeding Scorecard were shared to assist countries with their advocacy efforts
- Codex Committee on Nutrition and Foods for Special Dietary Uses (CCNFSDU). A number of Global Breastfeeding Collective members mobilized countries to participate in the committee meeting that was held in Dusseldorf, on November 24-29. The committee furthered the process of updating the Codex standard on follow-up formula
- Guiding Principles on Complementary Feeding. WHO held the first meeting of the Guidelines Development Group (December 2-4) to revise the 2003 and 2005 Guiding Principles documents. This first meeting scoped out the issues to be addressed and identified key systematic reviews to be conducted
- Training workshop on the application of NetCode tools for Code monitoring (December 8-13) in Johannesburg, South Africa. Sponsored by WHO and UNICEF, the training workshop built up the technical assistance capabilities of HKI, Save the Children, Alive & Thrive, and IBFAN along with regional representatives of WHO and UNICEF to apply the NetCode protocols for monitoring

Alive & Thrive



- Alive & Thrive (A&T) presented the **Cost of Not Breastfeeding** tool at the World Breastfeeding Conference in Rio de Janeiro in November
- With UNICEF, A&T supported the launch of "Stronger with Breastmilk Only," a regional campaign in West and Central Africa. A&T published advocacy briefs for each of the 24 countries, in English and French. A&T also published a research brief on exclusive breastfeeding in the region, in English and French.
- A&T published a guide to the International Code on Breastmilk Substitutes for health workers
- 50 people have completed A&T's **"Invest in Child Nutrition**" e-learning course, launched in August 2019; 937 people have signed up for the course

Important progress in the revision of the Standard for Follow-up Formula was made at the Codex Committee on Nutrition and Foods for Special Dietary Uses this year, which included strengthening labelling requirements.

Our Research Advisor, Dr. Alissa Pries, and colleagues published two articles in Nutrients recently. The **first article** (published in November) highlights the prevalence at which junk food and commercial sugar-sweetened beverages are being consumed by children in West Africa. The **second article** explores how the nutritional quality of snacks relate to dietary adequacy for young children in Nepal.

Global

 PATH, in partnership with the European Milk Banking Association (EMBA), convened a halfday workshop and training event for in-depth orientation to PATH's recently launched "Strengthening Human Milk Banking: A Resource Toolkit for Integrating and Establishing Human Milk Bank Programs."

India

- PATH has aided in establishing six human milk banks in four states and two centres of excellence
- PATH supported the government of Rajasthan in conducting an independent evaluation of 19 facility-based human milk banks.

- PATH's communication materials on breastfeeding and milk banking were launched by the Indian Health Minister and has been integrated into the National Breastfeeding Campaign.
- PATH advocated with the Indian Government to sign a cooperation to formulate BRICS network of human milk banks

• Through continued mentorship and technical assistance to Pumwani Maternity Hospital, the first human milk bank of Kenya was launched

Both sessions increased engagement and provided valuable feedback on how to further the EPC and WBW-SDG campaigns. Several of the sessions included the voices of women. Altogether it was a successful event in the World Breastfeeding Conferences series and culminated in the **Rio Declaration - A Call to Action**. IBFAN Arab World will host the WBC4 in Egypt in 2022.
