

WORLD BREASTFEEDING WEEK 2020 #WBW2020



WABA | WORLD BREASTFEEDING WEEK 2020

WABA coordinates the global World Breastfeeding Week (WBW) campaign every year. The slogan for #WBW2020 was "Support breastfeeding for a healthier planet" and focused on the need to support breastfeeding in light of the challenges facing our planet and its people. The outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic posed a challenge for celebrants everywhere to organise and participate in events. However, by increasing advocacy online and working with our partners to find creative methods of celebrating #WBW2020 globally, we ensured the success of the campaign.

WABA produced several resources that were shared widely including the Action Folder, Logo, Media Kit, Objectives, Poster & Banner, Presentation, Press Release, Relevant Resources and Social Media Kit. We collaborated with our allies in producing creative assets for the Social Media Kit, including social media posts, graphics (visuals & GIFs), Facebook profile frames and message boxes. Many global organisations shared our kit/assets, or created their own, such as the World Health Organization, the International Lactation Consultants Association, La Leche League International, the Indian IBFAN group Breastfeeding Promotion Network Of India (BPNI), 1000 Days, Alive & Thrive, the European Foundation for the Care of Newborn Infants, the Healthy Newborn Network and the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO).

In terms of campaign outreach, efforts include the provision of Seed Grants, driving Pledges and Reports of celebrations, sharing resources via email, creating YouTube videos and activities on social media including Facebook, Twitter and Instagram. Watch our videos to get ideas on how to provide skilled breastfeeding support in normal/crises situations, promote accurate infant feeding methods during emergencies and the importance of multi-sectoral collaboration in setting up milk banks. To date, we received over 1000 pledges for celebrations and over 500 reports from different regions, including the Americas, Africa, Eastern Mediterranean, Europe, Western Pacific and Southeast Asia. Collaboration is key in ensuring a successful campaign. This year, we engaged with individuals and organisations for greater impact, such as by featuring partners' events & publications on our website, organising the August & October AskMeAnything (#AMA) sessions with experts representing a variety of different organisations and expertise, celebrated the National Breastfeeding Month (#NBM) on social media, organised the August & October Twitter Storm sessions, and provided live coverage on social media for events such as the ILCA Conference and the WHO Webinar on Code Implementation and Monitoring.

The #WBW2020 campaign showed us that by working together, we can support breastfeeding for a healthier planet, particularly during a global crisis. The campaign involved UN bodies such as WHO, UNICEF, EWEC and UN Women, Civil Society Organisations (CSO) from around the

world, the media, and led to commitments on improving breastfeeding by the governments of many nations. It is important for us to adapt to the challenges around us, and use this crisis as an opportunity to build back better health systems.

WARM CHAIN OF SUPPORT FOR BREASTFEEDING



In different situations, with different service structures, the particular stakeholders of each sector have different roles to support breastfeeding dyad along the Warm Chain and link with those in the preceding and following sectors.

Community Members play an important role in promoting and advocating for breastfeeding in society. They can share personal experiences and strategies, and have a positive influence on infant feeding choices.

Environmentalists can play a role in the protection, promotion and support of breastfeeding by advocating for breastfeeding as a renewable and sustainable first food.

Obstetricians and Gynaecologists are primary healthcare providers for mothers before, during and after delivery. They can play an active role in breastfeeding support and enable mothers to achieve their infant feeding goals.

Young People have the power to change social norms by utilising innovative approaches and using diverse channels. They can thus play an active role in advocating for an enabling breastfeeding environment.

EMPOWERING PARENTS CAMPAIGN



The Empowering Parents Campaign was highlighted as part of the Warm Chain Campaign during the regional webinar series on Engaging Fathers in Breastfeeding Support - Perspectives from South East Asia. Paid leave and workplace support are critical for all parents after the delivery and post-partum period of the continuum of care during the first 1000 days. Key messages for the webinar are:

- a warm chain of support for breastfeeding by linking community peer groups and healthcare providers will provide unbiased, consistent breastfeeding information and support throughout the 1000 days
- improved national laws that cover maternity and parental social protection will support optimal breastfeeding
- workplace support such as breastfeeding facilities, paid breastfeeding breaks, and flexible working arrangements is critical to ensure that breastfeeding continues when parents resume work



Various tool for engaging parents (e.g. resources in the WABA resource hub, PAW chart, Warm Chain information cards and Fathers' Support for Breastfeeding Facebook group) can be adapted and used globally in all breastfeeding programmes.

Global Breastfeeding Collective



Publications:

- UNICEF recently disseminated a global overview of the Adoption of Breastfeeding Recommendations in the Context of COVID-19 following an online survey with 88 countries.
- UNICEF developed/adapted a Guide for employers: Breastfeeding support in the workplace: a global guide for employers.

Activities:

- UNICEF and WHO are finalizing an Implementation Guidance on Breastfeeding Counselling.
- WHO is finalizing the Infant and young child feeding counselling: training course.
- UNICEF has updated guidance on procurement of ready-to-use infant formula (initially released in 2019) to consider UNICEF's role as a provider of the first resort where needed. Final guidance will be ready for dissemination early next year.

Alive & Thrive



- The Alive & Thrive office in Southeast Asia organized a series of three webinars with UNICEF and Irish Aid that explored "Creating MIYCN-friendly health systems" on three key themes: COVID adaptations and SBC innovations; Pre- and In-service training; and Strategic use of data.
- The Alive & Thrive office in West Africa broadcast a sharing and learning cafe on the regional Stronger With Breastmilk Only initiative to increase the rate of exclusive breastfeeding and published a variety of the initiative's resources.

January-March 2021 - Activities planned

International Confederation of Midwives (ICM)



Over the past three months, ICM, together with leading international partners in global development and health, have conducted the Stronger Together Webinar Series - a collection of virtual conversations with midwives and the women they support. These conversations have taken place on webinars and podcast episodes and have attracted hundreds of listeners from around the world.

2020, the Year of the Nurse and the Midwife, is the springboard for the Decade of the Midwife, ICM's 10-year campaign that centres midwives as the key to delivering SDG 3.1 (reducing maternal death to 70 per 100,000). ICM will leverage learnings from her Stronger Together Webinar Series to develop the Decade of the Midwife campaign, ensuring an informed approach towards delivering SDG 3.

- Twenty years after the first People's Health Assembly in Dhaka, Bangladesh, People's Health Movement celebrated 20 years of its formation with a virtual event on 4th December 2020. Dr. Suwit Wibulpolprasert joined as the Keynote Speaker to comment on PHM and the need for health movements and people's participation to ensure Health for all.
